However, the importance of communication with students and peers is integral to building a strong online community just how communicating F2F is equally important in maintaining relationships in the real world.

I chose to become a teacher to share the experiences I had while I was a student. I want to give my students the best experience in my courses I can and provide them with useful tools and experiences to further their lives in whatever they decide to do with their lives. I strive to bring out the best in all my students and make an impact on as many I can. I also enjoy seeing the creativity in their works and look forward to seeing their creativity grow as they pursue their goals into adulthood.

In an online classroom, I have not a clue as to how my teaching experience or philosophy it would look or feel. My best guess would be to try and bring as much of my F2F experiences to the online environment as possible. I would use imagery, videos, forums, webinars and other tools if they could help me bring my presence closer to my students through that computer screen. I am not sure really how exactly I would do this, but that is why I am taking this program to build my skills and increase my understanding of the online world.
